SUPPORTED LIVING

Search opened its first community home in 1986, providing a supportive living environment for five people. Today, our Supported Living Program (SLP) serves 159 people across 27 welcoming homes in Chicago, Skokie, Mount Prospect and Morton Grove, fostering a true sense of community.

For those in our SLP, home is more than just a place to live, it's the foundation for independence, personal growth and meaningful connections. In a secure and comfortable setting, residents can pursue their passions, build lasting friendships and fully engage in their communities. Each person has the freedom to choose their home, fostering close bonds with roommates and creating a true sense of belonging.

Life in our SLP extends beyond the home. Residents participate in their community, attend Adult Learning programs and share experiences that enrich their daily lives. Our dedicated team of Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) provides 24/7 support, assisting with goal-setting, transportation, community activities and more. Through our Supported Living Program, we ensure every person has the resources and opportunities to thrive.

SELF-DIRECTED ASSISTANCE

Search's Self-Directed Assistance (SDA) program empowers people to take control of their own services, providing the support they need to live independently.

In FY24, 67 people supported by Search and their families utilized the SDA program to manage their services while continuing to live in their own homes or family homes. SDA offers guidance in finding, hiring and working with Personal Support Workers who respect each person's unique needs and preferences. The program also assists with budgeting, managing SDA funding, timekeeping and other employer-related tasks.

Through SDA, people gain the confidence and resources to make their own decisions and direct their care. Many also choose Search as their day services provider. The program supports people across the Chicagoland area, including Glenview, Northbrook, Schaumburg, Skokie, Arlington Heights, Chicago, Wilmette, Park Ridge, Evanston, Mount Prospect and beyond.



ADULT LEARNING

Our Adult Learning Program (ALP) provides meaningful experiences for people across four Search sites and one intermediate care facility, supporting an average of 253 participants each month. ALP services are available both in the community and at home, offering flexible opportunities for engagement and growth. At its core, ALP fosters community connections, empowering people to make friends, explore new experiences and embrace a sense of belonging.

In FY24, 195 participants took part in over 1,100 enriching activities across the Chicagoland area, from Evanston to downtown Chicago. They traveled via Pace Suburban Bus, Chicago Transit Authority, Metra train, Search vans or on foot, spending more than 17,000 hours discovering local attractions and events.

Participants visited destinations such as the Marriot Theatre, Briar Street Theatre, James M. Nederland Theatre, Chicago Shakespeare Theater, Christkindl Market, the Chicago Bean, Wintrust Arena, Sonny Acres Farm, UniverSoul Circus, Camp Fair Oaks, Oktoberfest, Chicago Botanic Garden, Daley Plaza, Soldier Field, The Art Institute of Chicago, Shedd Aquarium and Lincoln Park Zoo. Through these experiences, ALP continues to enrich lives, foster independence and strengthen community ties.

CAREER SERVICES

Search's Career Services connects people with meaningful employment opportunities at community businesses, providing job coaching and ongoing support to ensure success. In FY24, nine participants secured integrated, competitive jobs with local employers, including one placement in Home Goods.

Additionally, Search launched the Youth Initiative, supported by Career Services, in FY 24. The Youth Initiative provides students who are aging out of the public-school system with pre-employment transition supports. It also provides crucial support and service resources to students, schools and families. By doing so, it smooths the transition to adult living and sets participants on the optimal path to success. Throughout the fiscal year, Career Services conducted 19 outreach activities to introduce stakeholders to our new Youth Initiative and to provide information about our employment services. This resulted in six referrals for the Youth Initiative and 19 referrals for DRS funded employment services.

Partnering with over 20 businesses, including Jewel-Osco, Mariano's, Costco, Rivers Casino and Home Depot, Career Services creates pathways for people to enter the workforce and thrive.

CLINICAL SERVICES

In FY24, Search's Clinical Services division coordinated over 6,400 comprehensive medical appointments. Throughout the fiscal year, 13,500 hours of behavioral health support was provided for over 170 people between ten licensed clinicians.

Clinical Services works in close collaboration with our Supported Living Program, prioritizing the health and well-being of Search residents. To support their healing and growth, we provide comprehensive, wrap-around health services. Medical care is available at our two on-site clinics in Chicago and Mount Prospect, offering primary and nursing care. Additionally, on-site specialists provide services in women's health, vision, neurology, dietary care, lab work and diagnostic testing.

Behavioral Health Services include individual and group counseling and specialized therapies such as art and sensory integration therapy. Expanding our commitment to behavioral health in FY24, Search initiated efforts to become a licensed Behavioral Health Clinic (BHC) provider to expand behavioral health resources within the local communities we support. This will allow us to extend our reach to the broader community while also augmenting and enhancing support for some of our existing behavioral health clients.

SEARCH FOR ADVENTURE

For two decades, our Search for Adventure (SFA) program has given people in our Supported Living Program the opportunity to explore the world beyond their door, creating unforgettable social, cultural and recreational experiences. Since its inception in 2004, SFA has made more than 200 trips to 44 destinations, offering life-changing opportunities made possible by the generous support of our partner Toad&Co and their commitment to 1% for the Planet.

In 2024, we celebrated 20 years of SFA by sending 27 participants on five incredible journeys. The adventures took participants to Fair Oaks, Indiana to witness the solar eclipse, Universal Studios in Southern California, Bloomington, Illinois for the Special Olympics State basketball tournament, Portland, Maine for a Visibility Arts show, Branson, Missouri for a spectacular The Duttons' show, and the Mall of America in Minnesota. For eight people, it was their first time experiencing the excitement of SFA.

From packing and transportation to lodging and general support, our Search for Adventure team ensures each traveler has a safe, personal and memorable experience. We are proud to mark this milestone year and look forward to many more adventures!

VISIBILITY ARTS

Visibility Arts provides a space for both professional and emerging adult visual artists with intellectual and developmental disabilities to explore, learn, create and showcase their work. In 2024, Visibility Artists showed at 20 community shows and events around the Chicagoland area. Artists also achieved \$4,357 in art sales and \$10,599 in product sales, highlighting the growing impact and recognition of their work throughout 2024.

Visibility Artists regularly participate in exhibits and provide art education at Studio 3 and Park School in Evanston and City Elementary in Hyde Park. In 2024, show highlights include Northwestern University's Dittmar Gallery and Wirtz Center, the Oak Park Artisan Market and an expanded display at our Planet Access store during the holiday season. All of these experiences strengthen our artist's presence in the local arts community.

PLANET ACCESS

Search has long pioneered the development of social ventures to sustain and grow our impact on the people we support. Planet Access, a Toad&Co. partner store, is one of our longest standing ventures.

Planet Access is a joint venture between Search and our longtime social impact partner, Toad&Co. In FY24, we were thrilled to see our store reach \$611,723 in sales.

In FY24, the Planet Access store hosted our second annual Winter Windows in collaboration with Visibility Arts, along with collaborating with local businesses on products.

Included in our strategic plan for FY 24-26, Planet Access is setting its sights on a second location in the Chicagoland area. We are looking to expand the footprint of Planet Access by adding new store locations and improving our online e-commerce platform. Our goal is to increase income to support life changing travel experiences for people, expand inclusive employment opportunities for job seekers and increase opportunities for Visibility Artists to contribute their talents to the community.





COMMUNITY EDUCATION

Each year, Search's community education and advocacy initiatives reach thousands of people across the Chicagoland area, fostering greater awareness and inclusion for people with disabilities.

Disability Awareness Training (DAT)

One of Search's cornerstone community education programs is our Disability Awareness Training (DAT), offered through our social venture, JJ's List. These trainings equip organizations with the tools to integrate disability-aware customer service and employment practices into their core business strategies. Led by the Players, an engaging and interactive troupe of people with disabilities, DATs make a lasting impact. In FY24, we delivered this vital training to 983 people across 22 sessions.

NeurodiVERSED: Expanding Awareness & Advocacy

Our annual NeurodiVERSED campaign aims to celebrate neurodiversity and promote mental health awareness. This training seeks to dive deeper into disability awareness, stemming from our annual campaign advocating for deeper belonging. In FY24, we trained 148 people from five different organizations and schools.

Hop on the Bus to Independence

In partnership with Pace Suburban Bus, we continue to offer Hop on the Bus Trainings, free workshops designed to equip people with disabilities with the skills to safely and independently navigate fixed-route public transportation. In FY24, we reached 488 students and staff at local schools, empowering them with the knowledge and confidence to ensure transportation access.

ComEd Energy Force Ambassador Program

As part of the ComEd Energy Force Ambassador Program, the nation's first energy-efficiency education initiative led by people with disabilities, a Search participant serves as an Energy Force Ambassador each year. This program provides critical education on energy efficiency and creates paid employment opportunities for people with disabilities. In 2024, our Ambassador led 10 events, including at Eco Fest at Welles Park, Rib Fest and Botanical Garden-Winter Lights.

Community Education Through the Arts

In 2024, Search expanded its community education art classes, supported by a grant from the Evanston Arts Council. One notable class, led by Visibility Artists Pam and Kristina, focused on using art as a self-care technique, engaging community members in creative expression and well-being.

Strengthening Community Connections

Through these initiatives, people supported by Search have taken an active role in their communities, fostering a greater public understanding of disability inclusion. By expanding our training offerings and deepening our community engagement, we continue to build a more accessible and inclusive future for all.

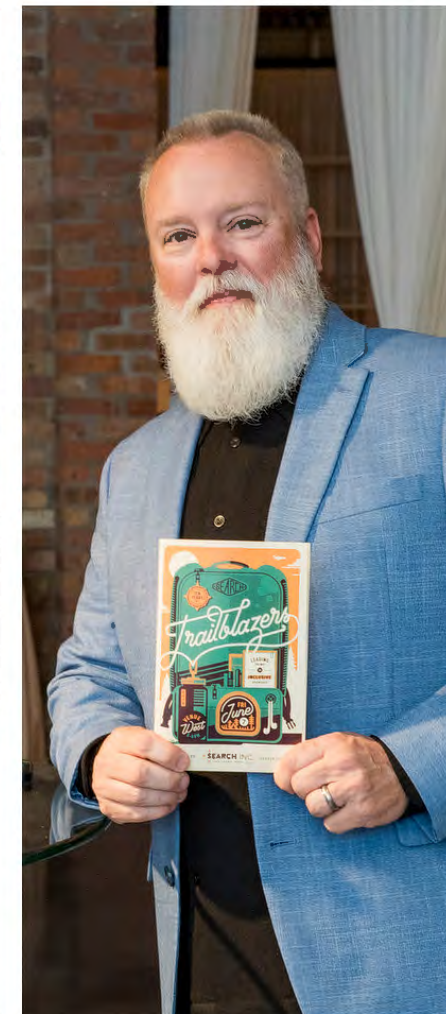

RALLA KLEPAK FOUNDATION for Education in the Performing Arts

Search is grateful to be a grantee of the Ralla Klepak Foundation for Education in the Performing Arts. The Ralla Klepak Foundation honors the legacy of Ralla Klepak, a fierce advocate, educator and attorney. She fought tirelessly for the rights of disadvantaged children and people with disabilities. To contribute to her goal of world peace, the Ralla Klepak Foundation funds performing arts programs across Chicagoland.

In 2024, the Ralla Klepak Foundation provided a \$67,000 grant, making 10 theater outings possible for 79 people. Their generous support has brought immense joy to Search, establishing theater as an integral part of our community.

This grant allowed us to have our second annual holiday theater program. During the holiday season, we attended six shows, including the highly-requested Harry Potter and the Cursed Child. Additionally, we saw holiday shows, such as Irving Berlin's White Christmas, at venues from Chicago's Nederlander Theatre to the Lincolnshire Marriott Theatre. We appreciated every moment at these shows and cannot wait for more nights at the theater soon!



10 YEARS OF TRAILBLAZERS

On June 7, 2024, we celebrated a decade of Trailblazers at Venue West in Chicago's West Loop. This special evening brought together our community to honor Search's efforts in promoting inclusion for people with disabilities while also marking 20 years of our inclusive travel program, Search for Adventure. With the support of our community, we raised over \$143,000 in support of our adventures during Trailblazers this year!

We were proud to recognize Toad&Co. under the leadership of Gordon Seabury, 1% for the Planet and Search for Adventure for their dedication to expanding opportunities for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Guests enjoyed an evening filled with cocktails, delicious food, a silent auction, wine pull, awards and more, all in support of Search's essential programs and services.

As our largest fundraiser of the year, 10 Years of Trailblazers raised critical funds to support our mission. We are deeply grateful to our sponsors, donors and attendees for making this milestone event a success and for their continued commitment to empowering people with disabilities.

RIVERS CASINO PARTNERSHIP

Since 2018, Search and Rivers Casino Des Plaines have built a strong, growing partnership, creating meaningful employment opportunities for people with disabilities. What started with one hire through our Career Services program has expanded into an ongoing collaboration, with Rivers making interview process adjustments, providing accessible training and fostering an inclusive workplace. Their commitment has led to the successful placement of multiple employees, including Adam, who shared, "When I applied, Rivers made me feel like a welcomed guest and before too long I was working there. I have now been there nine months. I continue to work there and look forward to new adventures and opportunities with Rivers." Overall, Rivers Casino has hired seven people through Search's Career Services program.

Beyond employment, Rivers has championed our mission in significant ways. They generously sponsored our 10 Years of Trailblazers event in June 2024, celebrating two decades of our inclusive travel program, Search for Adventure. Further strengthening our collaboration, Rivers invited Search leaders to their Rivers Gives breakfast, recognizing our impactful work together. We are deeply grateful for this partnership and look forward to continued success in empowering people with disabilities.

Benefitting programs for individuals with disabilities in Chicagoland.

Planet Access is a unique, high-end retail store with a mission. All purchases made at the store support the programs and mission of Search. Through our partnership with Toad&Co, we offer brands that specialize in sustainable, socially responsible clothing, jewelry and home decor.



NeurodiVERSED is our annual awareness campaign held in March during National Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month. NeurodiVERSED gives people who think differently a platform where they can share their voices and educate the community on mental health and intellectual disabilities. Our mission is to give neurodiverse people a platform to share their stories, art, experiences and celebrate the things that make them unique. NeurodiVERSED is led by self-advocates who share their lived experiences of neurodiversity with the broader community.



Search for Adventure (SFA) is a travel program that offers people with disabilities fully-arranged vacation experiences to destinations near and far. Trips are planned around the interests and preferences of a small group of fellow adventure seekers. Search for Adventure provides people with disabilities opportunities to explore the world outside their door, opening their life to memorable social, cultural and recreational experiences.



Visibility Arts provides a space for professional and emerging adult visual artists with intellectual and developmental disabilities to explore, learn, create and show their artwork. Visibility Arts is a combination of group learning experiences and hands-on studio time. Visibility Artists also enjoy regular opportunities to show and sell their work in a variety of galleries and public venues.



JJ's List is a social enterprise of Search that helps businesses connect with people with disabilities. The JJ's List website helps businesses integrate disability-aware marketing, branding, customer service and employment practices into core business strategies. In addition, people with disabilities use jjslist.com for self-advocacy by posting consumer reviews of the disability awareness of a businesses' services, products and staff.



Glidepath Curriculum is a unique program resource developed by Search, Inc. The curriculum provides your program staff with easy to follow instructions for providing a variety of rich, active experiences that meet the needs and preferences of people with a wide range of intellectual and developmental disabilities.



Ignite is a program that offers all of the benefits of the Glidepath Curriculum in a small-scale and flexible setting. The program provides access to employment services, therapeutic supports and access to hands-on technology training. Participants learn self-management skills and personal development in a balanced approach that includes fitness, wellness and visual arts classes.
